Theory-based readings and lectures needed more clarification. Lectures were often unfocused and unstructured. Readings were too dense and unconnected to lectures. The course website proved of little relevance and could have been better utilized.

Students described Lippincott as an outstanding lecturer who was lively, entertaining and funny. Students saw Lippincott as an effective and engaging instructor who loved what he taught, and was clearly enthusiastic about the material. Complex and tough material was made approachable and enjoyable and students were able to understand the material clearly with his examples, and he made the issues relevant to the present. There were extensive readings for the course which were dense and beyond the 200-level.

Students also expressed that slides or the chalkboard should have been used to map out the ideas that were being covered in lectures. Lectures could have been more focused and related to the texts. Students felt that essays were weighed too heavily; one essay in particular was worth 40%. Alternatively, students suggested that tutorial participation should have been mandatory and count towards the final grade.

Students felt strongly that a syllabus should have been compiled with required readings and dates. They also felt that Lippincott was inaccessible and unapproachable - students felt that he discouraged them to contact him. Lippincott had no course website, no email, no phone or office hours where students could communicate with him.
