A few students noted that the course content did not relate to Canada as much as the title of the course suggests.

Students overwhelmingly enjoyed the course and found it to be interesting as well as of high value.

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Jung seemed unenthusiastic, while others thought she was interesting, knowledgeable and funny. With respect to the subject matter, some did not expect the material and thought the course should be called "Democracy," while others thought the material was very helpful and informative.
