The Arts & Science Students' Union (ASSU) is sponsoring this award to recognize outstanding teaching at the undergraduate level in the Faculty of Arts & Science, St. George campus.

Criteria for the Award

The award is made on the basis of excellence in teaching and contributions to undergraduate education. In evaluating nominees, the following criteria are considered:

- *Stimulates and challenges students' intellectual capacity
- *Is skillful at communicating the course material to students
- *Shows mastery of the subject area
- *Is highly accessible to students
- *Influences development of students' intellectual and critical skills
- *Does anything else you feel makes them an outstanding educator

Eligibility for the Award

Any instructor who taught or is currently teaching in the 2025-26 academic year is eligible for nomination. Teaching staff of any rank are considered to be instructors: Full/Associate/Assistant Professors, Senior Lecturer, Lecturer. Teaching Assistants are not eligible for this award.

Nomination Procedure

Candidates may be nominated by <u>FULL-TIME</u> A&S students registered on the St. George campus only. Please read carefully and then fill out the reverse side of this form. Nominations must include a typed letter outlining the merits of the instructor and why you feel they deserve to win the teaching award. Feel free to attach letters of support.
